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## **1. INTRODUCTION**

### **1.1 SECURITY CLASSIFICATION**

This document is marked as **UNCLASSIFIED** as there are no sensitive details contained in it and it is expressly written to be circulated both internally and externally.

### **1.2 DATA INTEGRITY**

The statistics, tables and graphs contained in this document are based on substantiated cases, which are active investigations of an incident that has definitely happened. This is as opposed to using incident data, which is an initial recording of a crime that has yet to be substantiated.

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### **1.3 EXPLANATION OF GRAPHS**

The graphs used in this report include standard deviation, which has been used as a means of objectively measuring how much the crime rate has varied over time and is useful in identifying extreme highs and lows of crime. Standard deviation has been used so that where the crime rate is above the red line (2 standard deviation above the mean average), it is considered exceptionally high. Where the crime rate is below the blue line (2 standard deviation below the mean average), it is considered exceptionally low. In both cases it can be referred to as statistically significant (high or low) and is an indication of whether the quarterly statistics are exceptionally high or exceptionally low.

### **1.4 AIM**

The aim of this report is to produce accurate, timely, objective information that:

- Enables informed decisions to be made on the types of crime that threaten the safety of the community.
- Is used to proactively manage risks to the island and ensure effective policing, redeploying and directing resources at a strategic and tactical level, as required.
- Facilitates effective and open communication with our stakeholders, developing the means to inform them of the plans, efforts and progress being made by the BPS.
- Provides meaningful information as one of the means of reassuring communities in Bermuda.

**1.5 Executive Summary**

There were **1,163 offences** in **Q1 2012**, a **decrease** of **-0.2%** when compared to Q4 2011. All Crime in Q1 2012 is the **7<sup>th</sup> lowest quarterly figure since 2000**.

There was **1** murder and **2** injuries by firearms in Q1 2012.

Crimes Against The Person and Crimes Against The Community have **increased** when Q1 2012 is compared to Q4 2011. Crimes Against The Property has **decreased**. A summary of the 3 key crime headings and 20 crime categories for Q1 2012 in comparison to the previous quarter (Q4 2011), the same quarter last year (Q1 2011) and the 5 year trend is shown below in figure 1:

## 2. ALL CRIME

### 2.1 SUMMARY

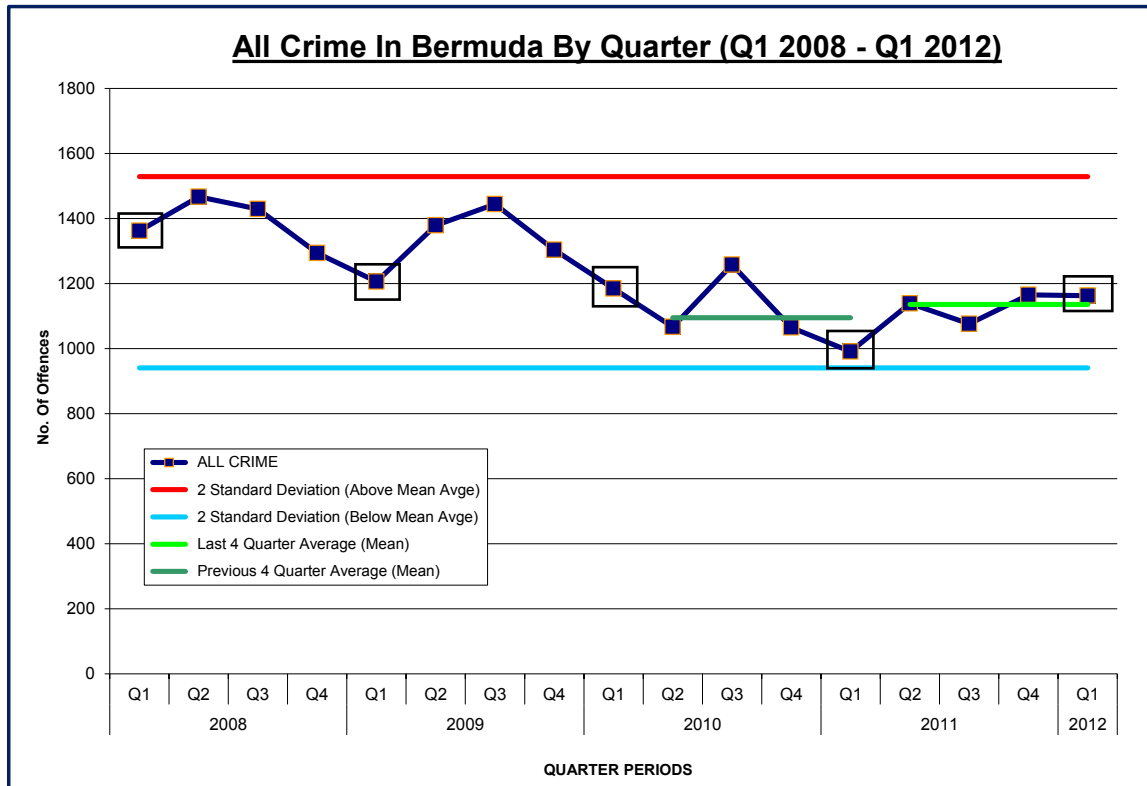
Figure 2: All Crime (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q1 2011 – Q1 2012)

The total for all crime in Q1 2012 **decreased** by **-2** offences or **-0.2%** compared to Q4 2011. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2011), Q1 2012 has **increased** by **+172** offences or by **+17.4%**. The total for Q1 2012 was **1,163** as can be seen in Figure 2:

### 2.2 TRENDS

**Q1 2012 is the 7<sup>th</sup> lowest quarterly crime figure since Q1 2000<sup>1</sup>.** In 2008 and 2009, all quarters were above 1,200 offences. Since 2010, only one quarter has been above 1,200 offences. This reinforces the view that there has been a **decrease** in the **long term trend of all crime in Bermuda**. This can be seen in Figure 3, which shows crime for the last 17 quarters, with Q1 figures highlighted in boxes:

### 3. CRIMES AGAINST THE PERSON

#### 3.1 SUMMARY

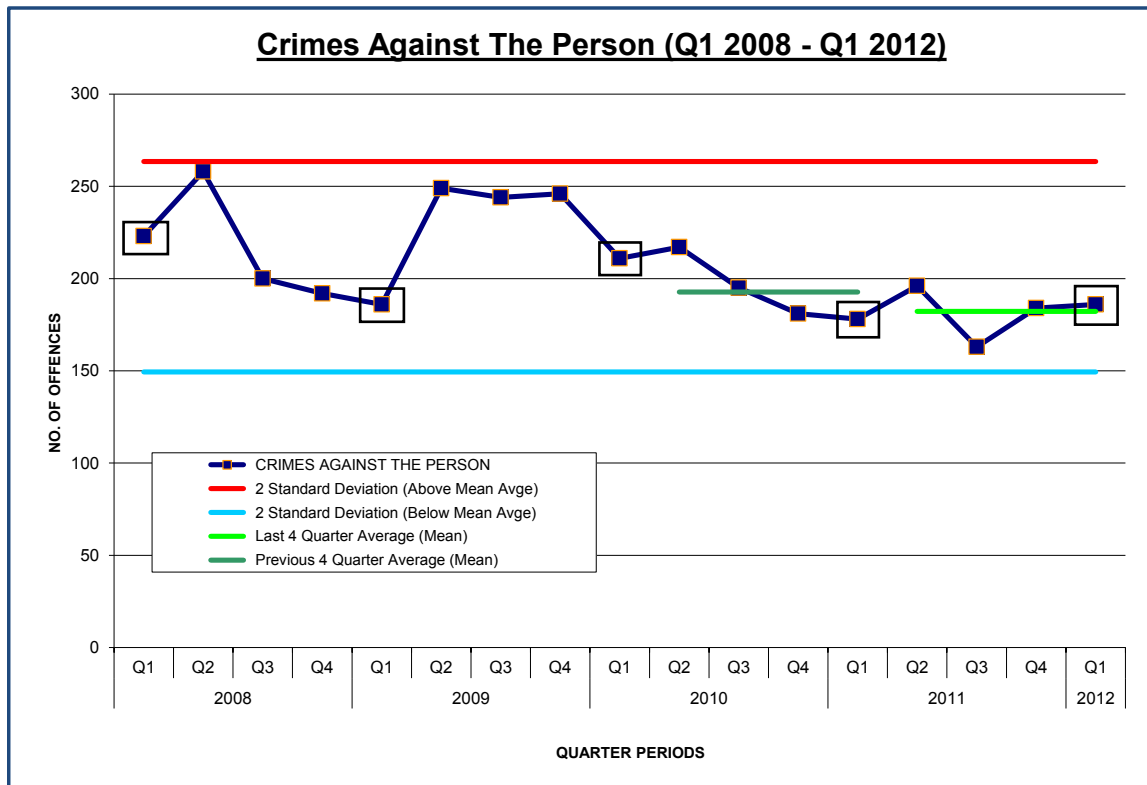
Figure 4: Crimes Against the Person (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q1 2011 – Q2 2012)

Crimes Against the Person offences in Q1 2012 **increased** by **+2** offences or **+1.2%** compared to Q4 2011. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2011), Q1 2012 has **increased** by **+8** offences or by **+4.5%**. The total for Q1 2012 was **186** as can be seen in Figure 4:

#### 3.2. TRENDS

In Q1 2012 the long term trend of Crimes Against The Person is **decreasing** with Q1 2012 the 7<sup>th</sup> consecutive quarter under 200 offences. When compared to Q4 2011, the notable crimes of Q1 2012 within the Crimes Against A Person category were Serious Assaults (**+7**) and Other Assaults (**+2**). A summary of Crimes Against The Person for the last 17 quarters can be seen in Figure 5, with Q1 figures highlighted in boxes:

Figure 5: Crimes Against the Person By Quarters (Q1 2008 – Q1 2012)



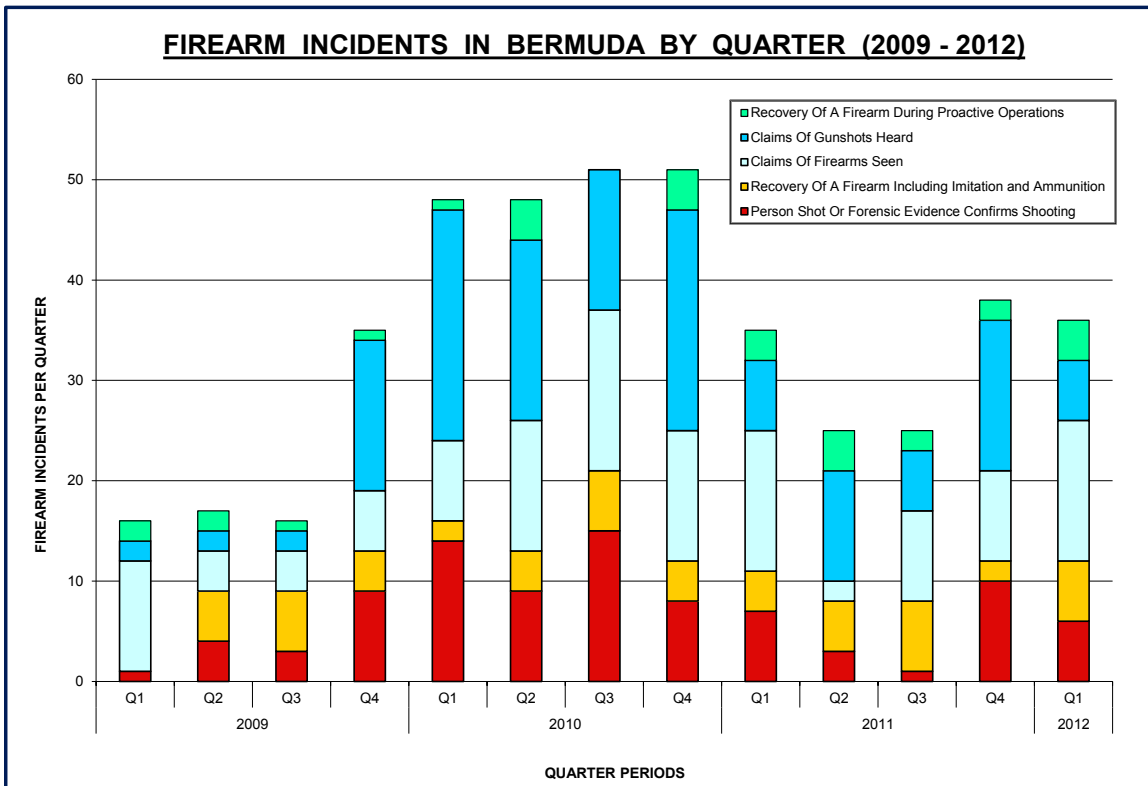
## 4. FIREARM INCIDENTS

Firearm Offences are included within Crimes Against The Community (Section 5); however firearm incidents<sup>2</sup> may not necessarily be recorded as offences, as often there is no suspect or even a victim.

### 4.1 SUMMARY

In Q1 2012 there were **36** firearm incidents of which **16** were confirmed firearm incidents and **20** were unconfirmed firearm incidents. This is an increase of 2 confirmed firearms incidents and a decrease of 4 unconfirmed firearms incidents when compared to Q4 2011, which had **38** firearm incidents. This can be seen in Figure 6 below, which shows firearm incidents between 2009 and 2012:

Figure 6: Firearm Incidents In Bermuda (2009 - 2012)



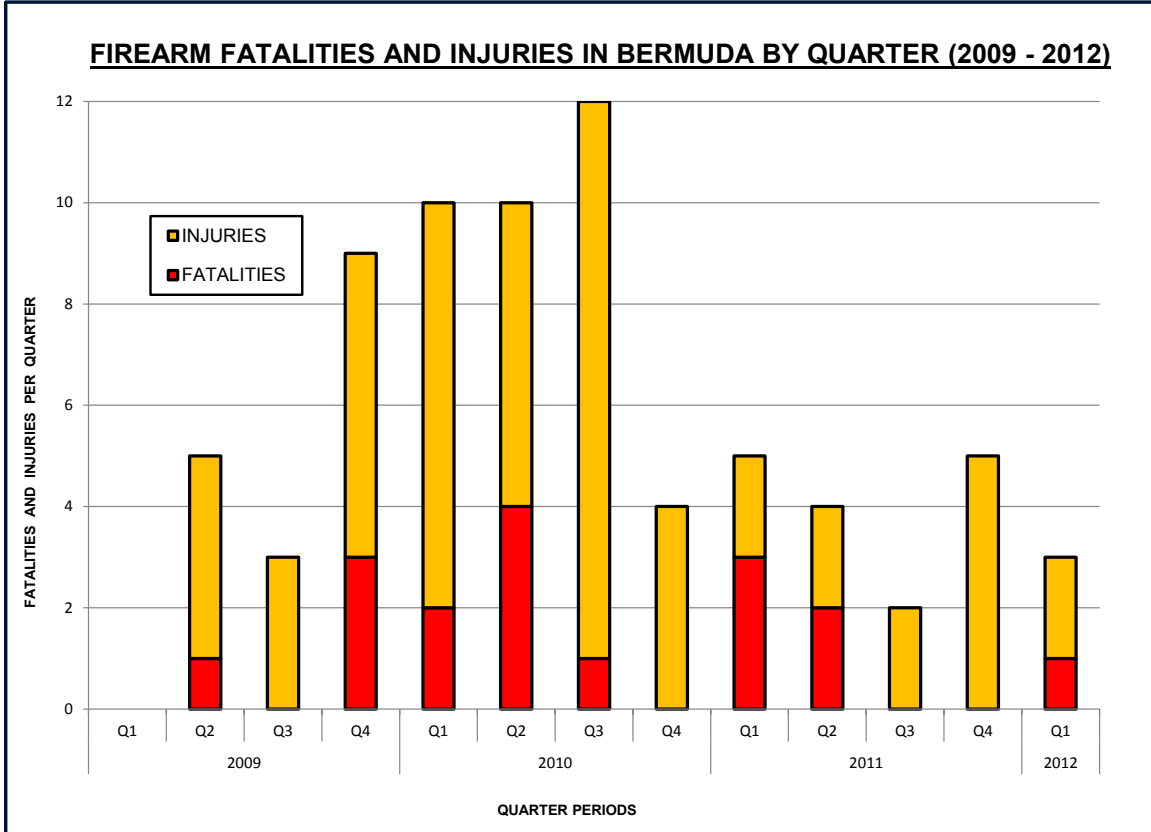
### 4.2 FIREARM TRENDS

The **16** confirmed firearm incidents in Q1 2012 included the recovery of **2** firearms. In Q1 2012 there was **1** fatality and **2** injuries. This brings the total number of persons shot since the dramatic increase of firearm incidents in Q1 2009 to **72**, of which **17**

<sup>2</sup> To enable accurate recording, analysis and reporting of firearm incidents, the BPS classifies firearm incidents into 4 categories which are split into either **confirmed** or **unconfirmed** categories. A confirmed incident is where forensic evidence proves the incident occurred e.g. a firearm has been seized, shell casings or bullets are recovered, or a person has a gunshot wound. **Person Shot or Forensic Evidence Confirms Shooting** and **Recovery of A Firearm Including Imitation and Ammunition** are classified as **Confirmed**, while **Claims of Firearms Seen** and **Claims Of Gunshots Heard** are classified as **Unconfirmed**.

## 5. CRIMES AGAINST THE COMMUNITY

### 5.1 SUMMARY

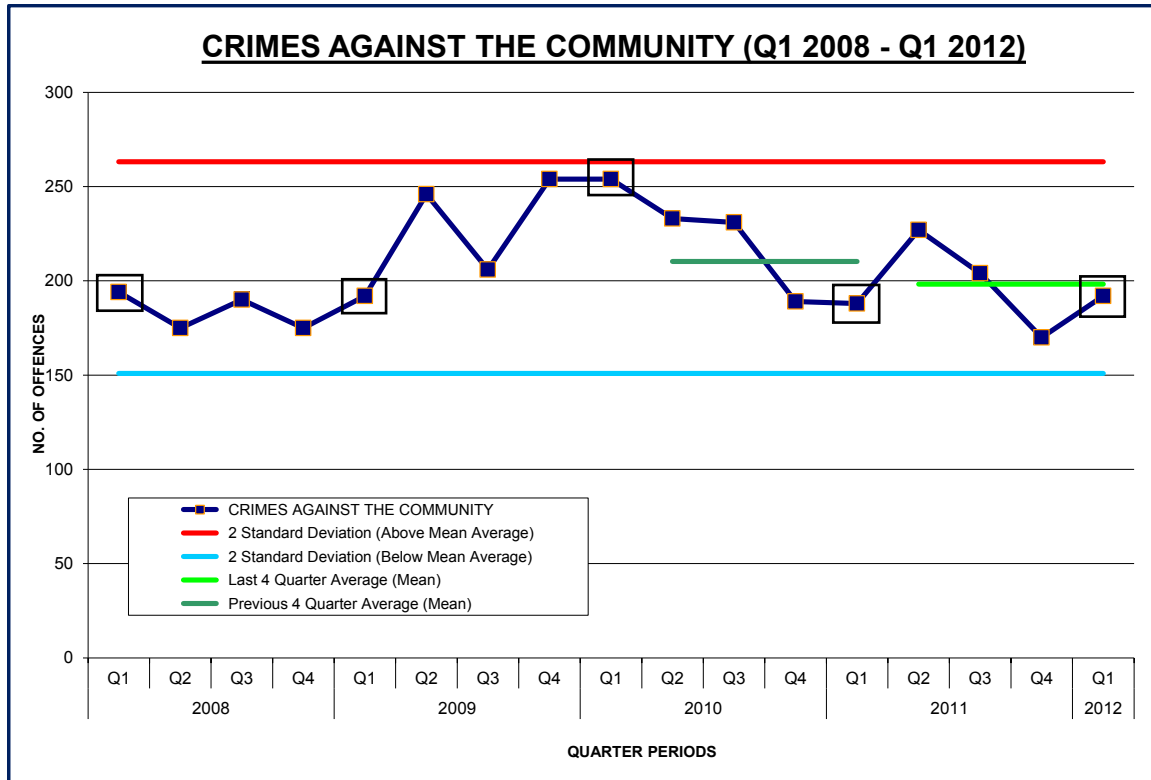
Figure 8: Crimes Against The Community (Last 5 Quarters Q1 2011 – Q1 2012)

Crimes Against The Community offences in Q1 2012 **increased** by **+22** offences or **+12.9%** compared to Q4 2011. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2011), Q1 2012 has **increased** by **+4** offences or by **+2.1%**. The total for Q1 2012 was **192** as can be seen in Figure 8:

### 5.2 TRENDS

Q1 2012 is slightly higher than Q1 2011, but there has been a decrease since Q1 2010. When compared to Q4 2011, Crimes Against The Community has increased in Q1 2012, especially Anti-Social Behaviour (**+16**). A summary of Crimes Against The Community for the last 17 quarters can be seen in Figure 9, with Q1 figures highlighted in boxes:

## 6. CRIMES AGAINST PROPERTY

### 6.1. SUMMARY

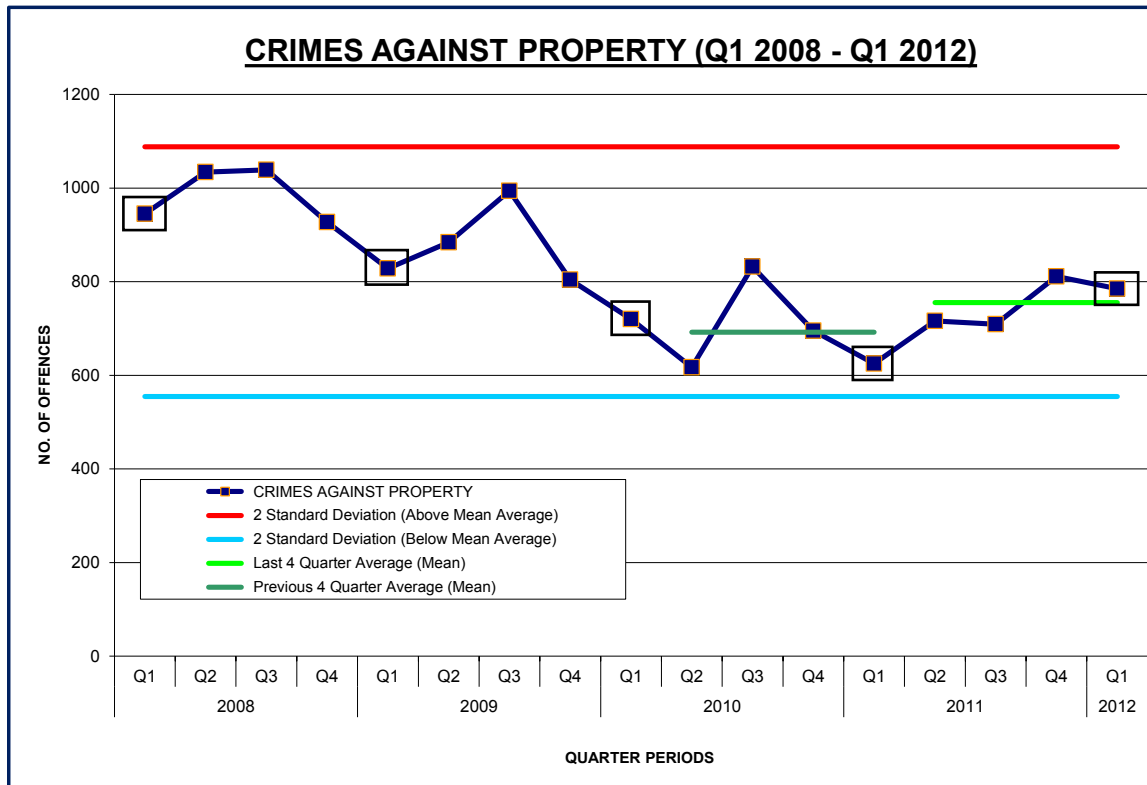
Figure 10: Crimes Against Property (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q1 2011 – Q1 2012)

Crimes Against Property offences in Q1 2012 **decreased** by **-26** offences or **-3.2%** compared to Q4 2011. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2011), Q1 2012 has **increased** by **+160** offences or by **+25.6%**. The total for Q1 2012 was **785** as can be seen in Figure 10:

### 6.2 TRENDS

The long term trend of Crimes Against Property is down; however, offences have increased from 625 in Q1 2011 to almost 800 offences in the last two quarters. Burglary (Residential) is at its highest since Q1 2000 (237 offences), however there was only 1 offence of Burglary (Tourist Accommodation) in Q1 2012. A summary of Crimes Against Property for the last 17 quarters can be seen in Figure 11, with Q1 figures highlighted in boxes:

## 7. TRAFFIC COLLISIONS

### 7.1 SUMMARY

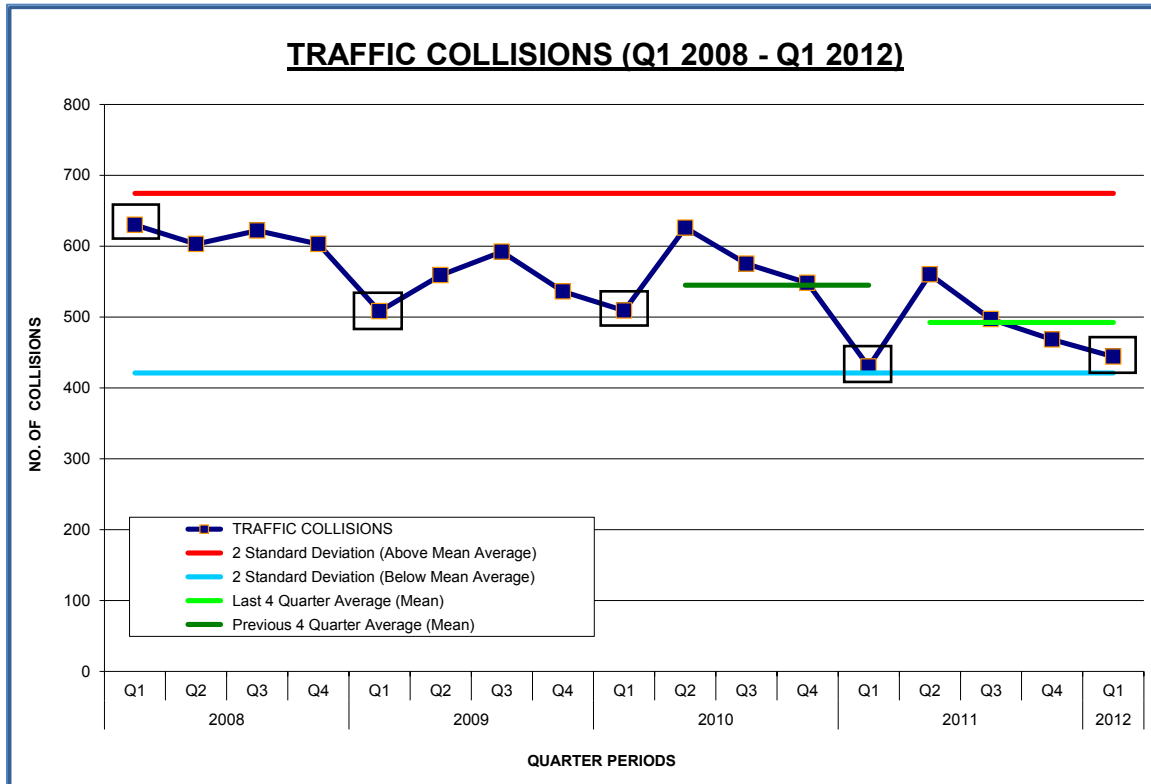
Figure 12: Traffic Collisions (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q1 2011 – Q1 2012)

Traffic Collisions<sup>3</sup> in Q1 2012 **decreased** by **-24** or **-5.1%** compared to Q4 2011. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2011), Q1 2012 has **increased** by **+14** or **+3.3%**. The total for Q1 2012 was **444** as can be seen below in Figure 12:

### 7.2 TRENDS

The long term trend of Traffic Collisions continues to decrease. From a high of **782** in Q4 2007, Traffic Collisions have decreased and the last 4 quarter running average was **492**. One of the most important categories of Traffic Collisions is fatalities and these have decreased substantially, with only **1** in Q1 2012. There was an increase in serious injury collisions compared to Q4 2011, but a decrease compared to Q1 2011. A summary of Traffic Collisions for the last 17 quarters can be seen in Figure 13, with Q1 figures highlighted in boxes:

### 8. DRUG ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITY

Drug Enforcement Activity refers to policing activity against drugs seized at the border, or activity that has led to arrests or seizures in Bermuda.

#### 8.1 SUMMARY

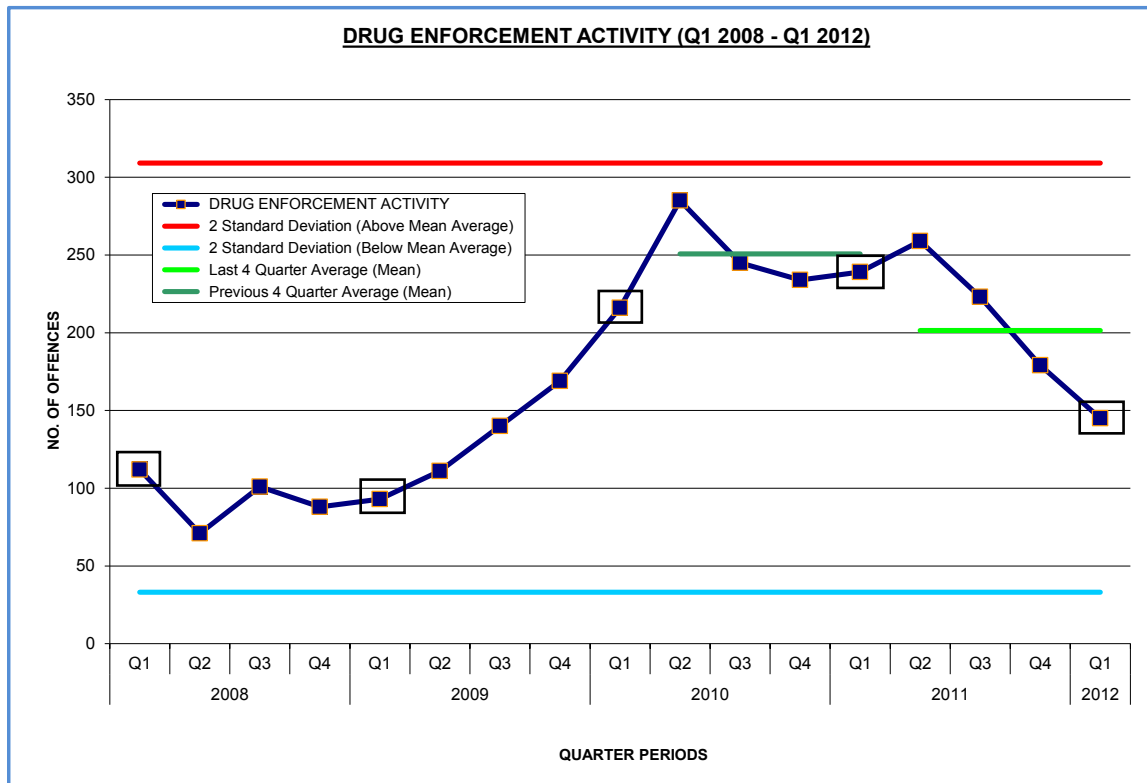
Figure 14: Drug Enforcement Activity (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q1 2011 – Q1 2012)

Drug Enforcement Activity in Q1 2012 **decreased** by **-34** or **-19%** compared to Q4 2011. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2011), Q1 2012 has **decreased** by **-94** offences or **-39%**. The total for Q1 2012 was **145** as can be seen in Figure 14:

#### 8.2 TRENDS

Drug Enforcement Activity has decreased in Q1 2012 when compared to Q4 2011, and the value of drugs seized has also decreased. A summary of Drug Enforcement Activity for the last 17 quarters can be seen in Figure 15, with Q1 figures highlighted in boxes:

### 8.3 Drug Seizures

The Bermuda Police Service continues to work with its partners both locally and overseas to disrupt the trafficking of controlled drugs. These partners include HM Customs Bermuda, U.S. Customs and the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration. Despite these partnerships, controlled drugs are still entering Bermuda which is evidenced in the number of 'street' level drug seizures. This can be seen in Figure 16, which shows Drug Seizures By Location:

As can be seen in Figure 16, the majority of drugs seized are at street level (**117**) while there were **26** seizures at ports (including LF Wade) and **2** overseas seizures which involved overseas law enforcement agencies.

An estimated total of **21 Kg** of controlled drugs with an estimated street value of **\$1.9 million** has been seized in Q1 2012 with Cannabis the most common drug with **16 Kg** seized at a value of **\$0.8 million**. Cocaine is the next highest, with **4.5 Kg** seized with a value of **\$1 million**. The type, weight and value of the drugs seized broken down by Port, Street and Overseas seizures can be seen below in Figure 17:

In comparison to Q4 2011, the value of drugs seized in Q1 2012 is of less value, with an estimated street value of **\$1.9 million** compared to **\$3.1 million**. This is due to the smaller number of overseas seizures and less seizures on the street of Heroin, Cannabis Plants and less seizures of Cannabis Resin at street and port level.

## 9. TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT ACTIVITY

### 9.1 SUMMARY

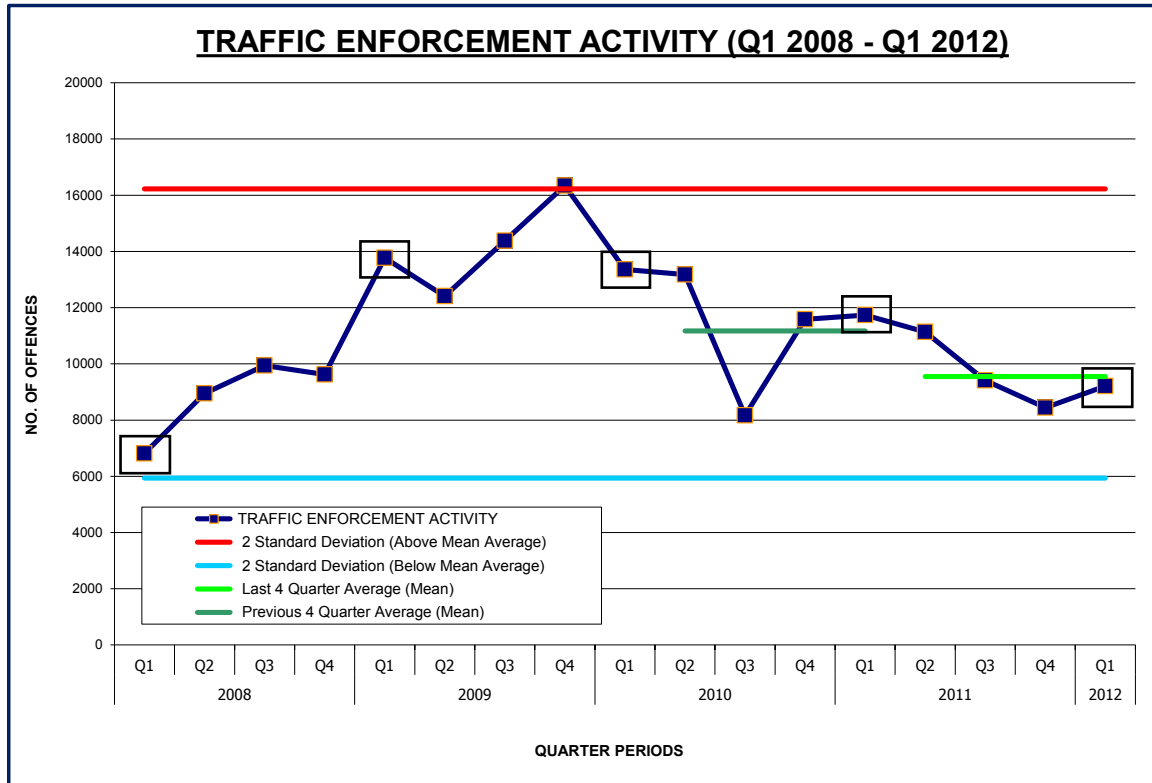
Figure 18: Traffic Enforcement Activity (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q1 2011 – Q1 2012)

Traffic Enforcement Activity in Q1 2012 **increased** by **+762** or **+9.0%** compared to Q4 2011. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2011), Q1 2012 has **decreased** by **-2,533** or **-21.6%**. The total for Q1 2012 was **9,206** as shown below in Figure 18:

### 9.2 TRENDS

Traffic Enforcement Activity has fluctuated between a low of **6,814** in Q1 2008 to a high of **16,342** in Q4 2009. With **9,206** in Q1 2012, Traffic Enforcement Activity is decreasing. ## **10. INCIDENTS - CALLS FOR SERVICE**

### **10.1 SUMMARY**

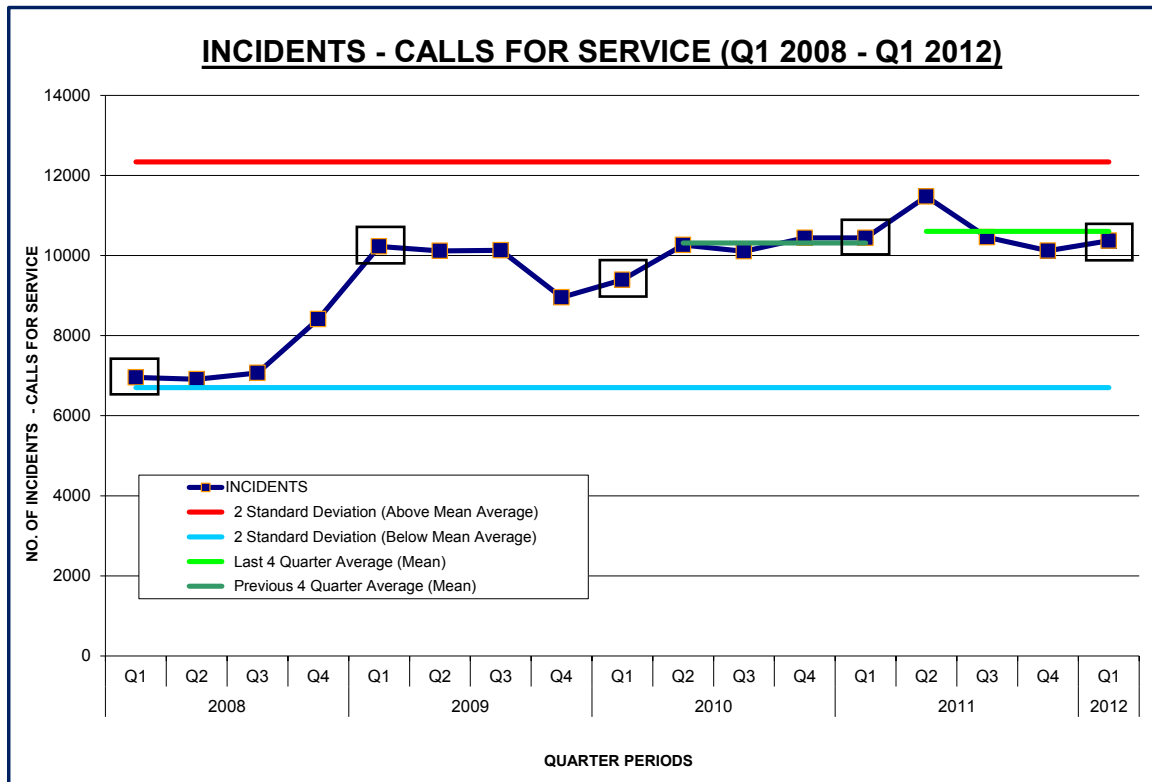
Figure 20: Incidents - (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q1 2011 – Q1 2012)

Incidents refer to all police activity and also to calls for service that have been recorded on the police computer system (New World System). Incidents in Q1 2012 **increased** by **+246** or **2.4%** compared to Q4 2011. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2011), Q1 2012 has **decreased** by **-71** or **-0.7%**. The total for Q1 2012 was **10,368** as shown in Figure 20:

### **10.2 TRENDS**

Q1 2012 saw an increase in incidents being recorded in comparison to Q4 2011. There have now been 6 consecutive quarters of more than 10,000 incidents being recorded. This represents a continued increase in policing activity and calls for service. This can be seen in Figure 21, which shows incidents for the last 17 quarters, with Q1 figures highlighted in boxes:

## 11. ARRESTS - ALL OFFENCES

### 11.1 SUMMARY

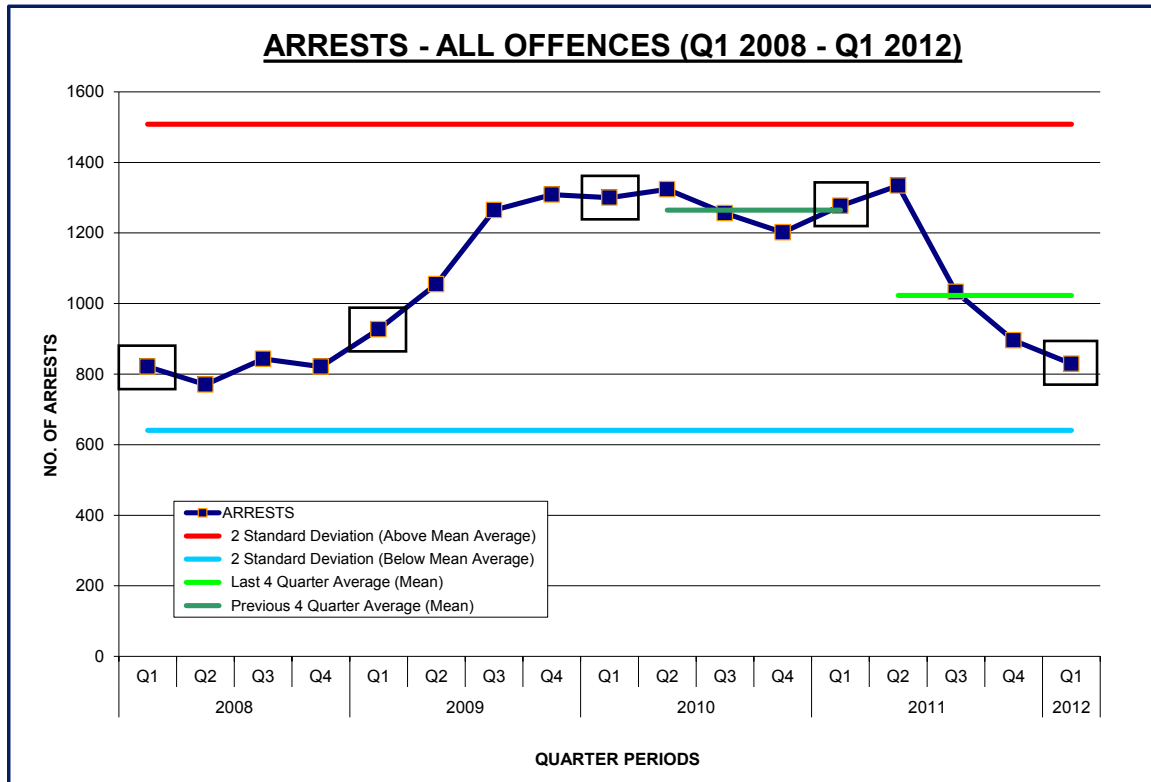
Figure 22: Arrests - All Offences (Last 5 Quarter comparison Q1 2011 – Q1 2012)

Arrests refer to those persons arrested and brought into police custody. Arrests in Q1 2012 **decreased** by **-67** or **-7.5%** compared to Q4 2011. In comparison to the same period last year (Q1 2011), Q1 2012 has **decreased** by **-448** or **-35.1%**. The total for Q1 2012 was **829** as shown in Figure 22:

**11.3 GENDER**

Of the **829** persons arrested in Q1 2012, **713** were male and **116** were female.

**11.4 AGE**

Analysis of persons arrested by age revealed that individuals from 18 to 25 years of age were arrested more frequently than any other age group (**240**), followed closely by those aged 26 to 35 (**214**). A breakdown of persons arrested by their age group can be seen below in Figure 24:

**11.5 NATIONALITY**

Of the **829** persons arrested in Q1 2012 **784** were Bermudian and **45** were foreign nationals. This is similar to previous quarters.

**11.6 ETHNICITY**

The majority of individuals arrested were black (**740**), with **62** individuals being white. In addition, **1** of those arrested was Asian, **3** individuals fall into the category 'black and white' and **19** individuals fall into the category 'other'. This is also similar to arrest figures in previous quarters. A breakdown of persons arrested by their ethnicity can be seen below in Figure 25:

**11.7 TYPE OF ARREST**

Of the **829** persons arrested in Q1 2012, the most common category was 'all other offences' which includes HMC, apprehension, SJA and civil warrants with **284**. **11.8 RECIDIVISM**

Of the **829** persons arrested in Q1 2012, **65** individuals were arrested more than once and accounted for **153** of the arrests for this period.

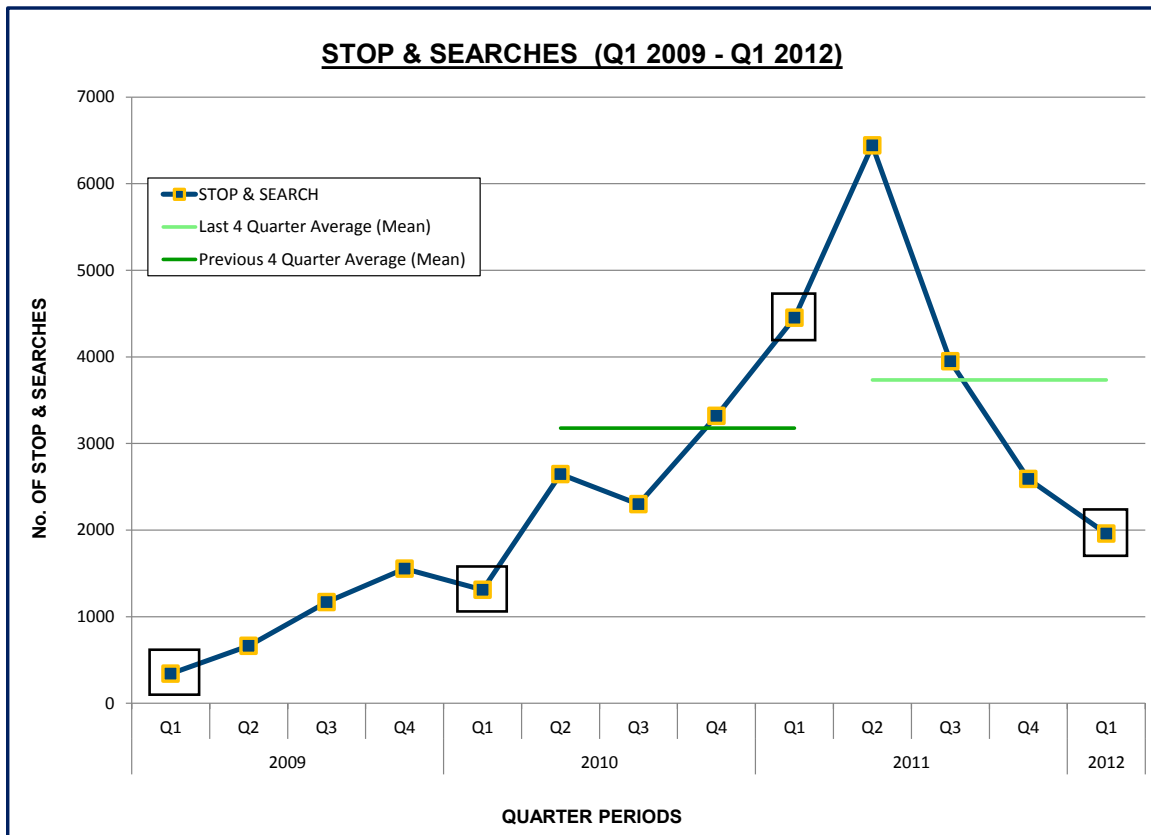
## **12. STOP AND SEARCHES**

### **12.1 SUMMARY**

Stop and Searches are conducted in a proportionate and accountable manner and only when Police Officers have occasion to exercise lawful powers. They are carried out with courtesy, consideration and respect for the individual being stopped. While the figures are not performance indicators, they are a reflection of the frequency of engagement between proactive Police Officers and Prolific Priority Offenders. They provide an indication of police activity, particularly regarding the number of highly visible patrols in the community.

There were **1,960** Stop and Searches in Q1 2012, a **decrease** of **-629** or **-24.3%** compared to Q4 2011. In comparison to Q1 2011, Q1 2012 has **decreased** by **-2,491** or **-56.0%**. This can be seen in Figure 28, showing Stop & Searches for the last 13 quarters, with Q1 figures highlighted in boxes:
